Today's Readings

1st Reading Amos 7.7-17

⁷ This is what he showed me: the Lord was standing beside a wall built with a plumb-line, with a plumb-line in his hand.

⁸ And the Lord said to me, 'Amos, what do you see?' And I said, 'A plumb-line.' Then the Lord said,

'See, I am setting a plumb-line in the midst of my people Israel; I will never again pass them by;

⁹ the high places of Isaac shall be made desolate,

and the sanctuaries of Israel shall be laid waste,

and I will rise against the house of Jeroboam with the sword.'

¹⁰ Then Amaziah, the priest of Bethel, sent to King Jeroboam of Israel, saying, 'Amos has conspired against you in the very centre of the house of Israel; the land is not able to bear all his words.

¹¹ For thus Amos has said, "Jeroboam shall die by the sword, and Israel must go into exile away from his land."'

¹² And Amaziah said to Amos, 'O seer, go, flee away to the land of Judah, earn your bread there, and prophesy there;

¹³ but never again prophesy at Bethel, for it is the king's sanctuary, and it is a temple of the kingdom.'

¹⁴ Then Amos answered Amaziah, 'I am no prophet, nor a prophet's son; but I am a herdsman, and a dresser of sycamore trees,

¹⁵ and the Lord took me from following the flock, and the Lord said to me, "Go, prophesy to my people Israel."

¹⁶ 'Now therefore hear the word of the Lord.

You say, "Do not prophesy against Israel, and do not preach against the house of Isaac."

¹⁷ Therefore, thus says the Lord: "Your wife shall become a prostitute in the city,

and your sons and your daughters shall fall by the sword,

and your land shall be parcelled out by line; you yourself shall die in an unclean land, and Israel shall surely go into exile away from its land."

2nd Reading Colossians 1.1-14

¹ Paul, an apostle of Christ Jesus by the will of God, and Timothy our brother, ² To the saints and faithful brothers and sisters in Christ in Colossae: Grace to you and peace from God our Father. ³ In our prayers for you we always thank God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, ⁴ for we have heard of your faith in Christ Jesus and of the love that you have for all the saints, ⁵ because of the hope laid up for you in heaven. You have heard of this hope before in the word of the truth, the gospel ⁶ that has come to you. Just as it is bearing fruit and growing in the whole world, so it has been bearing fruit among yourselves from the day you heard it and truly comprehended the grace of God. ⁷ This you learned from Epaphras, our beloved fellow-servant. He is a faithful minister of Christ on your behalf, ⁸ and he has made known to us your love in the Spirit. ⁹ For this reason, since the day we heard it, we have not ceased praying for you and asking that you may be filled with the knowledge of God's will in all spiritual wisdom and understanding, ¹⁰ so that you may lead lives worthy of the Lord, fully pleasing to him, as you bear fruit in every good work and as you grow in the knowledge of God. ¹¹ May you be made strong with all the strength that comes from his glorious power, and may you be prepared to endure everything with patience, while joyfully ¹² giving thanks to the Father, who has enabled you to share in the inheritance of the saints in the light. ¹³ He has rescued us from the power of darkness and transferred us into the kingdom of his beloved Son, ¹⁴ in whom we have redemption, the forgiveness of sins.

Gospel Reading Luke 10.25-37

²⁵ Just then a lawyer stood up to test Jesus. 'Teacher,' he said, 'what must I do to inherit eternal life?' ²⁶ He said to him, 'What is written in the law? What do you read there?' ²⁷ He answered, 'You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your strength, and with all your mind; and your neighbour as yourself.' ²⁸ And he said to him, 'You have given the right answer; do this, and you will live.' ²⁹ But wanting to justify himself, he

asked Jesus, 'And who is my neighbour?' ³⁰ Jesus replied, 'A man was going down from Jerusalem to Jericho, and fell into the hands of robbers, who stripped him, beat him, and went away, leaving him half dead. ³¹ Now by chance a priest was

going down that road; and when he saw him, he passed by on the other side. ³² So likewise a Levite, when he came to the place and saw him, passed by on the other side. ³³ But a Samaritan while travelling came near him; and when he saw him, he was moved with pity. ³⁴ He went to him and bandaged his wounds, having poured oil and wine on them. Then he put him on his own animal, brought him to an inn, and took care of him. ³⁵ The next day he took out two denarii, gave them to the innkeeper, and said, "Take care of him; and when I come back, I will repay you whatever more you spend." ³⁶ Which of these three, do you think, was a neighbour to the man who fell into the hands of the robbers?' ³⁷ He said, 'The one who showed him mercy.' Jesus said to him, 'Go and do likewise.'

in the midst of the gods he gives judgement.

2 'How long will you judge unjustly:
and favour the cause of the wicked?

3 'Judge for the poor and fatherless:

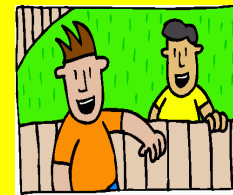

Hello Dear Friends

I pray you have had a good week. Today is the fifth Sunday after Pentecost and also Sea Sunday - especially important for us here at St John's and in Albany as we minister closely with our own Mission to Seafarers. I very much cherish my roles as Chaplain to the Seafarers.

The role of seafarers often goes under appreciated within the maritime industry and by the general public. Seafarers are an essential component in world trade, keeping the economy moving and delivering the goods and fuels we use every day.

We are grateful for the ministry of Mission to Seafarers worldwide and their faithful service and support.

**Heavenly Father, we commend to you all seafarers.
Guard and protect them in danger and temptation;
sustain them in loneliness;**

and support them in sickness and anxiety.

Bless all who minister to them.

**Watch over those who are near and dear to them,
and grant them the blessing of your presence.**

These things we ask through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Our Sentence for today has me thinking of my Mum as this was most definitely one of her favourite verses - "do unto others as you would have them do to you". We pray collectively that we are helped to love God and neighbour with all we have. The prophet Amos gives us visions of judgement to come upon Israel. The Psalmist gives exhortation to judge and tells us of the doom of evildoers, then Paul salutes the Colossians and blesses God for their faith, hope and love. He then prays for their fruitfulness and spiritual knowledge. Our Gospel for today is the Parable of The Good Samaritan. This Parable also tells us of the testing of character.

I read a story about a man called Larry Skutnik aged 28 who was a shy man who worked in a government office in Washington. On the afternoon of January 13, 1982, a severe snowstorm hit the city. He was on his way home when he ran into a traffic jam on one of the bridges over the Potomac River. He soon realised what the cause of it was – a plane with seventy-nine people on board had crashed into the river. He got out of his car to investigate and saw three people clinging to the tail of the aircraft which was sticking out of the water.

A helicopter brought two of them to the shore but the third, a woman, fell back into the freezing water and started to go under. Without a thought, he took off his shoes and jacket, dived into the freezing water, and brought the woman to the shore. Afterwards he says he just wanted to go home. And after a brief trip to hospital, he was allowed to do so.

His daring act of rescue was captured on television. He woke up next morning to find himself a national hero. But he shied away from the publicity. 'The word "hero" makes me cringe', he said. 'I reacted instinctively. That's all'.

It's nice to know that people still recognise the greatness of an act like that. And it's nice to know that someone can do such an act and look on it as something normal and natural.

According to Tolstoy, one event does not tell us the whole of a person's life. What it does is place a person in a situation. Then, from the way the person deals with that situation, his or her character is revealed to us.

That is precisely what Jesus does in his story. He places the priest, the Levite, and the Samaritan in a situation. They are faced with a decision: to stop and help the wounded man, or to continue on about their own business? There is no escape for them, and no place to hide. They have to commit themselves one way or another.

The priest and the Levite decide to pass by; the Samaritan decides to stop and help.

Crisis does not create character; it merely reveals it. In times of crisis people reveal what is already inside them – the generous person or the selfish person, the hero or the coward. One moment or event may cause a person to reveal his essential being. The encounter with the wounded man was such a moment for the priest, the Levite and the Samaritan.

What did it reveal about the characters of the priest and Levite? It revealed a very damning thing, namely, that they were self-centred people. They would not put themselves out to help another person. When the crunch came, they put themselves first.

And what did it reveal about the character of the Samaritan? A very admirable thing, namely, that he was a caring person. He was the kind of man who could not pass another human being in pain without wanting to relieve that pain.

Our God is a God of love, a God of compassion, whose heart goes out to his people, especially when they're in need. And that's why the "Good Samaritan" was the hero of this particular parable: because it was he who put his faith into action. He knew what God would have wanted him to do in that particular situation, and he had the courage of faith to do it. And this of course is our challenge today.

Included below is the State of the Industry Snapshot: Bullying and Harassment at Sea Foreword written by Arsenio Dominguez, Secretary-General, International Maritime Organization (IMO).

“On the Day of the Seafarer 2025, the International Maritime Organization supports Sailors’ Society’s crucial report on bullying and harassment in the maritime sector, aligning closely with our global campaign: “My Harassment-Free Ship”.

Seafarers are the lifeline of international trade, yet they continue to face unacceptable levels of bullying, harassment, and discrimination, significantly impacting their mental health, safety, and career progression.

The data presented in this comprehensive report from Sailors’ Society paints a troubling picture. Bullying and harassment remain distressingly prevalent, with clear regional and gender disparities: women and active seafarers consistently experience higher rates of abuse compared to their counterparts.

Equally concerning is the pervasive culture of silence, driven by fear of retaliation, mistrust in reporting mechanisms, and skepticism about meaningful resolutions.

IMO’s “My Harassment-Free Ship” initiative aims precisely at addressing these systemic issues. By promoting proactive industry action, accessible reporting channels, and robust accountability mechanisms, we seek not merely to respond but to prevent.

Encouragingly, Sailors’ Society identifies practical solutions such as stronger enforcement of anti-harassment policies, committed leadership, and continuous on board education.

These actions resonate deeply with IMO’s vision of a respectful and inclusive maritime industry, where dignity and human rights are paramount.

I urge governments, shipping companies, maritime institutions, and seafarers themselves to engage actively with our

campaign and Sailors’ Society’s recommendations.

It is only through collaborative effort and unwavering commitment that we can dismantle harmful practices and nurture a culture of zero tolerance towards harassment.

The launch of IMO’s Interactive World Map exemplifies our collective commitment to providing seafarers with vital resources and support wherever they are. Similarly, amplifying seafarer voices through influential online platforms ensures the message of respect and dignity reaches every corner of the maritime community.

Mission of The Month for July is Albany Women’s Refuge and Pivot Support Services

Albany Women’s Centre offers women, with or without children, affected by family and domestic violence a safe refuge and support services.

Services provided at the centre include:

- 24 hour on call service.
- Safe, secure crisis accommodation
- Case management support.
- Outreach services
- Support Groups.
- Community Education

Family and domestic violence is when one person in a relationship uses abusive behavior in order to control the other person. Some ways this can happen are:

- Hitting, punching or pushing you, slapping, kicking and choking.
- Threatening to hurt your friends, family members or pets.
- Putting you down in front of others.
- Making you feel stupid and worthless, insults, threats, intimidation.
- Making you have sex when you don’t want to.
- Not letting you go out, or contact friends or family.
- Not letting you have money for food, clothing or other basic needs.
- Not allowing you to attend church, making fun of your beliefs.

The above behaviours can cause shame, low self esteem, isolation, physical injuries, the inability to trust people, depression and many other side effects.

At St Johns we provide much needed toiletry packs to these women in need. This service was initiated by the Ladies Guild and has continued on after the cessation of this group. Your donations will go towards assisting with making sure we are able to continue this service.

Pivot Support Services was established in 2005 as Regional Counselling and Mentoring Services, specifically to work with the Department of Corrective Services (DCS) in the rehabilitation and reintegration of prisoners and released offenders. Originally, they worked out of a small office above a pizza shop, then moved to a residential house and, for the last eight years, have operated out of a commercial premise at 121 Aberdeen Street, Albany.

Since establishment Pivot has become the predominant provider of Prisoner Reintegration services in the Great Southern region. The Great Southern is unique in the regional corrective services context as it is the only region with a maximum-security prison and the only one with three facilities, namely Albany Regional Prison (ARP), Pardelup Prison Farm (PPF) and the Walpole Work Camp (WWC).

Over the last three years Pivot has developed a role in providing services to those in the community suffering disadvantage or crisis. This model allows clients to access any service provider in the Great Southern.

This Community Hub model is becoming increasingly successful and has become an effective collaborative and integrated model of service provision.
