²⁸ And just as I have watched over them to pluck up and break down, to overthrow, destroy, and bring evil, so I will watch over them to build and to plant, says the Lord.
²⁹ In those days they shall no longer say: 'The parents have eaten sour grapes,

and the children's teeth are set on edge.'

30 But all shall die for their own sins; the teeth of
everyone who eats sour grapes shall be set on
edge.

The days are surely coming, says the Lord, when I will make a new covenant with the house of Israel and the house of Judah.

³² It will not be like the covenant that I made with their ancestors when I took them by the hand to bring them out of the land of Egypt— a covenant that they broke, though I was their husband, says the Lord.

³³ But this is the covenant that I will make with the house of Israel after those days, says the Lord: I will put my law within them, and I will write it on their hearts; and I will be their God, and they shall be my people.

³⁴ No longer shall they teach one another, or say to each other, 'Know the Lord', for they shall all know me, from the least of them to the greatest, says the Lord; for I will forgive their iniquity, and remember their sin no more.

2nd Reading 2 Timothy 3.10-4.5

3 ¹⁰ Now you have observed my teaching. my conduct, my aim in life, my faith, my patience, my love, my steadfastness, ¹¹ my persecutions, and my suffering the things that happened to me in Antioch, Iconium, and Lystra. What persecutions I endured! Yet the Lord rescued me from all of them. ¹² Indeed, all who want to live a godly life in Christ Jesus will be persecuted. 13 But wicked people and impostors will go from bad to worse, deceiving others and being deceived. ¹⁴ But as for you, continue in what you have learned and firmly believed, knowing from whom you learned it, ¹⁵ and how from childhood you have known the sacred writings that are able to instruct you for salvation through faith in Christ Jesus. 16 All scripture is inspired by God and is useful for teaching, for reproof, for correction, and for training in righteousness, ¹⁷ so that everyone who belongs to God may be proficient,

equipped for every good work. 4 1 In the presence of God and of Christ Jesus, who is to judge the living and the dead, and in view of his appearing and his kingdom, I solemnly urge you: ² proclaim the message; be persistent whether the time is favourable or unfavourable: convince, rebuke, and encourage, with the utmost patience in teaching. ³ For the time is coming when people will not put up with sound doctrine, but having itching ears, they will accumulate for themselves teachers to suit their own desires, 4 and will turn away from listening to the truth and wander away to myths. ⁵ As for you, always be sober, endure suffering, do the work of an evangelist, carry out your ministry fully.

Gospel Reading Luke 18.1-14

¹ Then Jesus told them a parable about their need to pray always and not to lose heart. ² He said. 'In a certain city there was a judge who neither feared God nor had respect for people. ³ In that city there was a widow who kept coming to him and saying, "Grant me justice against my opponent." ⁴ For a while he refused: but later he said to himself. "Though I have no fear of God and no respect for anyone, ⁵ yet because this widow keeps bothering me, I will grant her justice, so that she may not wear me out by continually coming." ' 6 And the Lord said, 'Listen to what the unjust judge says. ⁷ And will not God grant justice to his chosen ones who cry to him day and night? Will he delay long in helping them? 8 I tell you, he will quickly grant justice to them. And yet, when the Son of Man comes. will he find faith on earth?' 9 He also told this parable to some who

trusted in themselves that they were righteous and regarded others with contempt: 10 'Two men went up to the temple to pray, one a Pharisee and the other a tax-collector. ¹¹ The Pharisee, standing by himself, was praying thus, "God, I thank you that I am not like other people: thieves, rogues, adulterers, or even like this tax-collector. 12 I fast twice a week, I give a tenth of all my income." 13 But the tax-collector, standing far off, would not even look up to heaven, but was beating his breast and saying, "God, be merciful to me, a sinner!" 14 I tell you, this man went down to his home justified rather than the other: for all who exalt themselves will be humbled, but all who humble themselves will be exalted.'

The Psalm for today is Psalm 119, Verses 97-104.

⁹⁷ Lord, how I love your law: it is my meditation all the day long. 98 Your commandments have made me wiser than my enemies: for they remain with me for ever. ⁹⁹ I have more understanding than all my teachers: for I study your commands.

100 I am wiser than the aged: because I have kept your precepts. ¹⁰¹ I have held back my feet from every evil path: that I might keep your word; ¹⁰² I have not turned aside from your judgements: for you yourself are my teacher. 103 How sweet are your words to my tongue: sweeter than honey to my mouth. ¹⁰⁴ Through your precepts I get understanding: therefore I hate all lying ways.

Hello Dear Friends

I pray you have had a good week. We are in the middle of a very exciting month and I'm so looking forward to our anniversary celebrations.

Getting ready for big events requires prayer, persistence and often a good measure of humility - subjects covered in our readings for this week.

Our sentence refers to justice granted to those persistent in prayer, we pray together for 24/7 reliance on God's care and strength. Jeremiah's reading can be interpreted as God's care over the Church. The Psalmist talks of his love of God's law - what we love we think of! Paul writes to Timothy and talks of patience and his own example and encourages his friend to continue in the same ways - the ways of Scripture and to do so diligently. Our Gospel today (as we approach the end of Luke's special section) is two parables - the persistent widow and the pharisee and the tax collector.

No one can live a Christian life without prayer. But we have to understand what prayer is and what it does. I found a couple of stories!!!

Three men were trapped in a dark cellar which had no doors or windows. How did they react to their predicament?

The first was a writer by the name of George. He had no faith. He just sat there cursing the darkness. 'There's nothing we can do', he said despairingly. 'We might as well resign ourselves to our fate'.

The second was Peter, who was a very religious man. He prayed for a long time. When he had finished, he sat back and waited for a miracle.

The third man was a bricklayer by the name of Ivan. He was quite religious in his own way. But he was also a very practical man. He had a small chisel in his pocket. With the light of a match, he found a small stone. Using this as a hammer he began to chip away at the wall.

The work was slow, monotonous and extremely tiring. He got dust in his eyes, and blisters on his hands. Neither of the other two showed any inclination to help him. George sat in one corner smoking. Peter sat in another corner praying. From time-to-time Ivan too prayed: 'Dear God, I believe that with your help we can make it out of here. So, help me now please'.

Finally, after hours of painful work, a big stone dislodged itself and light streamed in from next door. He began to shout joyfully: praising and thanking God at the same time. His two companions helped him to widen

the hole, and eventually all three crawled through and were free.

Here we see three different attitudes to prayer. For George it was waste of time. Since he had no faith, his attitude was logical. If you don't believe in God, who can you pray to? For Peter, prayer was a substitute for action. So, once he had prayed, he sat back and waited for God to come to his rescue. A lot of Christians today pray like that: especially when praying on behalf of others. But prayer should be more than words alone: just think, God may just want to use us to answer our prayer.

Ivan believed in prayer, not however as a substitute for action, but as a spur to action. Having prayed, he immediately took whatever action he could. Believing that God would enable him through his prayer! Therefore, his prayer served the purpose of keeping up his courage and hope. It also gave him a sense of God's nearness, and an assurance that God had not abandoned him. He drew great strength from this. And Jesus urges us in the Gospel to pray continually and never lose heart.

Prayer does make a difference. It sustains us, and it opens the door for God to act in that given situation. Those who pray should never lose heart. When we turn our thoughts to God, we feel a new strength in our soul, in our entire being. 'Without divine assistance I cannot succeed; with it I cannot fail', said Abraham Lincoln.

Faith and prayer are interconnected. Prayer is the oil that keeps the lamp of faith burning.

And onto the second parable: The prayer of the Pharisee went like this: 'I thank you, God, that I am not grasping, unjust, adulterous like the rest of mankind, and particularly that I am not like this Tax-Collector here. I fast twice a week; I pay tithes on all I get'.

The prayer of the Tax-Collector might well have gone like this: 'Lord, look at the Pharisee standing up there so that everybody can see him praying. He thinks he's better than everybody else. He despises people like me. See the long robes he's wearing so as to make himself feel holy: and attract attention to himself.

'Everything he does is done, not to bring honour to you, but to win the esteem of others, and thus bring honour to himself. He makes sure to get the seats of honour at banquets and in the synagogue. He loves it when people salute him in the marketplace and call him "Rabbi". 'He gets all hot and bothered about silly little rules of his own making, while neglecting the things that really matter – the practice of justice and mercy. He's good at laying down the law for others. He ought to practise what he preaches. He lives off

the contributions of widows.

'Ah, Lord, don't be taken in by him. It's all an act, it's all a show. He's not genuine. He may look clean on the outside, like a whitewashed tomb, but inside he's full of corruption. He's the biggest hypocrite on two feet'.

All this and more the Tax-Collector could have said. And the Lord might have added, 'I agree with every word you've said', because the Lord himself said all these things about the Pharisees. But the Tax-Collector said nothing of the sort. Instead, he simply said, 'God, be merciful to me, a sinner'.

What the Pharisee did was confess the sins of others, while at the same time parading his own good deeds. The Tax-Collector did the exact opposite. He confessed his own sins and left the sins of others between them and God. As a result, the Tax-Collector went home at peace with God, whereas the Pharisee did not. We have Jesus' word for this.

It's easy to get into the habit of confessing the sins of others. But it's dangerous because it prevents us from looking at our own sins. Besides, it's impossible to weigh the sins of others without putting our own finger on the scales.

The Scottish biblical scholar, William Barclay, told the following story.

He was on a train journey from Scotland to England. As he was passing through the Yorkshire Moors he spotted a little whitewashed cottage. Its radiant whiteness shone out against the drab moors. A few days later he passed that way again. Meanwhile snow had fallen and covered the ground. He came again to the little whitewashed cottage. But now its whiteness actually seemed drab against the virgin whiteness of the snow.

If we should be tempted to compare ourselves with others, let us compare ourselves only with Christ himself. When we lay our imperfect lives beside his sinless life, all we will be able to say is: 'Lord, be merciful to me: I am a sinner'.
