⁶ Now we command you, beloved, in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, to keep away from believers who are living in idleness and not according to the tradition that they received from us. 7 For you yourselves know how you ought to imitate us; we were not idle when we were with you, 8 and we did not eat

anyone's bread without paying for it; but with toil and labour we worked night and day, so that we might not burden any of you. ⁹ This was not because we do not have that right, but in order to give you an example to imitate. ¹⁰ For even when we were with you, we gave you this command: Anyone unwilling to work should not eat. ¹¹ For we hear that some of you are living in idleness, mere busybodies, not doing any work. 12 Now such persons we command and exhort in the Lord Jesus Christ to do their work quietly and to earn their own living. ¹³ Brothers and sisters, do not be weary in doing what is right.

Gospel Reading Luke 21.5-19

⁵ When some were speaking about the temple, how it was adorned with beautiful stones and gifts dedicated to God, he said. 6 'As for these things that you see, the days will come when not one stone will be left upon another; all will be thrown down.' They asked him. 'Teacher, when will this be, and what will be the sign that this is about to take place?' 8 And he said, 'Beware that you are not led astray; for many will come in my name and say, "I am he!" and, "The time is near!" Do not go after them. ⁹ 'When you hear of wars and insurrections, do not be terrified; for these things must take place first, but the end will not follow immediately.' 10 Then he said to them, 'Nation will rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom; ¹¹ there will be great earthquakes, and in various places famines and plagues: and there will be dreadful portents and great signs from heaven. 12 'But before all this occurs, they will arrest you and persecute you; they will hand you over to synagogues and prisons, and you will be brought before kings and governors because of my name. ¹³ This will give you an opportunity to testify. ¹⁴ So make up your minds not to prepare your defence in advance; 15 for I will give you words and a wisdom that none of your opponents will be able to withstand or contradict. 16 You will be betrayed even by parents and brothers, by relatives and friends; and they will put some of you to death. ¹⁷ You will be hated by all because of my name. ¹⁸ But not a hair of your head will perish. 19 By your endurance you will gain your souls.

Hello Dear Friends

I pray you have had a good week. This Sunday is the twenty third after Pentecost and the last Sunday of Liturgical Green for quite a while.

Our sentence is a blessing from Paul - oh to feel that peace in all times and ways! We pray for a longing for God's Kingdom and patient endurance. We are blessed with two Isaiah readings - the first is a prophesy of the future happy and flourishing state of the church. The second is A Song of Isaiah in place of our Psalm - it's from chapter 12 and our Monday Morning Prayer Canticle. This is a hymn of praise suited to the times of the Messiah and suitable for the return of the outcasts of Israel from their long captivity, but it is especially suitable to the case of a sinner, when first finding peace and joy in believing.

Paul, in his second letter to the Thessalonians, expresses his confidence in them, prays for them and charges them to withdraw from disorderly ways, particularly from being lazy and busybodies.

In our Gospel, Jesus gives His prophecy. Jesus didn't hold anything back from his disciples. He told them that things would be difficult. When he spoke about the world, he was very realistic. He spoke about wars and revolutions, earthquakes, plagues and famines, persecution and imprisonment, betrayal, hatred and killings. A bit like our news feeds today.

He told them that such happenings would provide them with an opportunity to bear witness to him and to the Gospel. It is in times of darkness that the light is needed. It is in times of falsehood that the truth is needed. It is in times of hatred that love is needed. It is in times of war that peace is needed. And it is in difficult times that Christian witness is needed.

By forewarning them Jesus was forearming them. He was saying: You'll need wisdom – don't be deceived. You'll need courage – don't be afraid. You'll need staying power and endurance – don't give up. He will see to it that they will triumph in the end, provided they remain steadfast.

Our times offer numerous opportunities to bear witness to Jesus and his Kingdom. The many tragedies and disasters that occur in our world could easily lead us to despair and convince us that we are the sad victims of circumstances. But this is not how Jesus looked at events. He called them opportunities.

Faith seems to thrive in adversity. Indeed, sometimes faith is born out of adversity. In this respect it resembles certain wildflowers: put them in a garden and they go to seed; but put them on a mountainside and they bloom.

During the communist regime in Russia there was a ten-year-old girl whose whole family had been scattered to distant labour camps because of their belief in God. The girl was first taken to an orphanage. There, she refused to give up the crucifix her mother had hung around her neck before leaving. She tied a knot so that they could not take it from her during sleep. The struggle went on and on, but it was no good. She would not give up the cross.

She also refused to submit herself to retraining and to daily lessons in party propaganda. In the orphanage she was forced to live with children who were the very dregs of Russian society. Yet she refused to curse or steal. They never broke her. She ended up doing ten years in a labour camp.

In a world of so much social and political turmoil, people of faith will often be regarded as naïve and ineffective and irrelevant. However, we must not be afraid of scepticism and cynicism, but trust that God will give us the strength to hold our ground.

What sustains us is the belief that ultimately good will triumph over evil. So, even in the midst of turmoil, joy can be ours, because we know that God is with us. That knowledge gives us strength to live through tragedy with our spirit unbroken.

Jesus spoke about the destruction of the Temple. This would have come as a shattering blow to any Jew. Our generation has seen enormous changes. It's not a building but a whole world that has passed away. The only thing that endures is God's faithfulness. The only thing that does not change is God's love for us.

Faith is not a way of wishing that things were different. No one is helped by denial. Faith gives us the strength to cope with reality as it is. God does not spare us pain: rather God enables us to live through it.
