Hello Dear Friends

This week we say hello to Summer and continue our Advent journey. We will have enjoyed our Albany pageant and the first of our carol singing. Our sentence for the second Sunday of Advent tells us that "The Kingdom of God is near!" We pray for help to hear the voice of judgement and that we be found pure.

Isaiah paints a picture of promise and tells of the peaceful character of Christ's kingdom and subjects. Psalm 72 is a psalm of David. He begins with a prayer for Solomon, then prophesies the glories of his reign for which he praises God.

Paul gives us directions how to behave towards the weak and how we are to receive one another.

Matthew talks of John the Baptist, his preaching, manner of life and baptism and his reproof of both the Pharisees and the Sadducees.

One of the images Isaiah uses to describe the messianic age is that of a lamb lying down with a wolf and having nothing to fear. It is a picture of a time of universal peace – the strong would no longer prey on the weak, or the cunning on the innocent.

Advent, with its wonderful promises of a new world, takes us on a trip to a place called hope. If things and people were perfect, hope would not be needed. Hope is required precisely because we live in an imperfect world. We invest our hopes in flawed politicians. So why not in God?

Hope doesn't mean sitting back waiting for things to happen. Hope spurs us into action. It is precisely because we have hope that we work so hard. We believe our efforts are worthwhile, and that they do make a difference. Our strength, our commitment, depends to a great extent on the degree and quality of our hope.

Vaclay Havel Václay was a Czech statesman, author, poet, playwright, and former dissident. Havel served as the last president of Czechoslovakia. He once said: "I am neither an optimist nor a pessimist. I just carry hope in my heart. Hope is not a feeling of certainty that everything ends well. Hope is just a feeling that life and work have a meaning".

Cynicism is the enemy of hope. Many refuse to accept hope into their hearts. They say: 'Things will never change. It's no good'.

Cynicism comes easy. It requires nothing from us – no trust, no effort, no love.

Hope is not the same thing as optimism though. In fact, hope and optimism are radically different. Optimism is the expectation that things will get better, whatever the situation. Hope is the trust that God will fulfil his promises in his way and in his time. The person of hope lives in the present moment, with the knowledge and trust that all of life is in God's hands.

Hope springs from faith that God will fulfil the promises he has made to us. He has given us his word in Jesus. That word is the basis on which our hope rests. And that hope is an anchor of our lives.

All great leaders were people of hope. They felt no need to know what the future would look like. They just tried to do what was right in the present and trusted that God would take care of the future. It was enough for them to know that our God is a faithful God.

But what does this mean for us today? St Paul brings it down to everyday realities. He says, 'Treat each other in the same friendly ways that Christ has treated you'. This would make a big difference. It's easy to be critical, to be over-hasty in making judgements, to be intolerant of the faults of others. If we did as Paul suggests we would make the world, or at least our corner of it, a more hopeful place.

It is the task of Christians everywhere to keep hope alive: and to set an example. However, we must not depend on results, but only on the rightness and truth of the work itself. We thank God for God's blessings in the past and ask God's help for what we must yet achieve.

When all is said and done, this world will never fulfil our deepest hopes. Only God can do that. Meanwhile, we live in a place called hope. This hope

enables us to keep one foot in the world as it is: and the other in the world as it should be.
