Today's Readings

1st Reading Exodus 24.12-18

¹² The Lord said to Moses, 'Come up to me on the mountain, and wait there; and I will give you the tablets of stone, with the law and the commandment, which I have written for their instruction.' ¹³ So Moses set out with his assistant Joshua, and Moses went up into the mountain of God. ¹⁴ To the elders he had said, 'Wait here for us, until we come to you again; for Aaron and Hur are with you; whoever has a dispute may go to them.' ¹⁵ Then Moses went up on the mountain, and the cloud covered the mountain. ¹⁶ The glory of the Lord settled on Mount Sinai, and the cloud covered it for six days; on the seventh day he called to Moses out of the cloud. ¹⁷ Now the appearance of the glory of the Lord was like a devouring fire on the top of the mountain in the sight of the people of Israel. ¹⁸ Moses entered the cloud, and went up on the mountain. Moses was on the mountain for forty days and forty nights.

2nd Reading 2 Peter 1.16-21

¹⁶ For we did not follow cleverly devised myths when we made known to you the power and coming of our Lord Jesus Christ, but we had been eyewitnesses of his majesty. ¹⁷ For he received honour and glory from God the Father when that voice was conveyed to him by the Majestic Glory, saying, 'This is my Son, my Beloved, with whom I am well pleased.' ¹⁸ We ourselves heard this voice come from heaven, while we were with him on the holy mountain. ¹⁹ So we have the

prophetic message more fully confirmed. You will do well to be attentive to this as to a lamp shining in a dark place, until the day dawns and the morning star rises in your hearts. ²⁰ First of all you must understand this, that no prophecy of scripture is a matter of one's own interpretation, ²¹ because no prophecy ever came by human will, but men and women moved by the Holy Spirit spoke from God.

Gospel Reading Matthew 17.1-9

¹ Six days later, Jesus took with him Peter and James and his brother John and led them up a high mountain, by themselves. ² And he was transfigured before them, and his face shone like the sun, and his clothes became dazzling white. ³ Suddenly there appeared to them Moses and Elijah, talking with him. ⁴ Then Peter said to Jesus, 'Lord, it is good for us to be here; if you wish, I will make three dwellings here, one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah.' ⁵ While he was still speaking, suddenly a bright cloud overshadowed them, and from the cloud a voice said, 'This is my Son, the Beloved; with him I am well pleased; listen to him!' ⁶ When the disciples heard this, they fell to the ground and were overcome by fear. ⁷ But Jesus came and touched them, saying, 'Get up and do not be afraid.' ⁸ And when they looked up, they saw no one except Jesus himself alone. ⁹ As they were coming down the mountain, Jesus ordered them, 'Tell no one about the vision until after the Son of Man has been raised from the dead.'

Hello Dear Friends

How quickly do we find ourselves almost at the end of our Epiphany season and preparing for our Lenten journey. Today we celebrate The Transfiguration of Our Lord.

Our sentence from Matthew's Gospel we hear again the voice of God. We pray collectively to be freed from our own anxieties and submit fully to our faith in God.

Our Exodus reading tells us of Moses' going up into the mountain. Our Psalmist issues threats against the enemies of God's Kingdom and talks of the promised one as head of that Kingdom. We read from The second letter of Peter this week.

This epistle clearly is connected with the first epistle of Peter. The apostle having stated the blessings to which God has called Christians, exhorts those who had received these precious gifts, to endeavor to improve in graces and virtues. They are guarded against impostors and scoffers, by disproving their false assertions, and by showing why the great day of Christ's coming was delayed, with a description of its awful circumstances and consequences; and suitable exhortations to diligence and holiness are given. In our passage for today Peter stresses the truth of the gospel relating to Christ's appearing to judgment.

We then hear of the ultimate "Mountain top experience" as Matthew describes the events of the transfiguration.

If you picture an old oil lamp covered with layers of dust and dirt. How wretched and useless it looks. Then someone comes along, cleans off the layers of dirt, polishes it until it begins to sparkle, and lights it. Suddenly the lamp is transformed. It positively glows, radiating light and beauty to every corner of the room. Whereas prior to this it was disfigured with dust and dirt: now it is transfigured and a thing of beauty. Yet it's the same lamp. When an object (or a person) is loved and cared for: it is reborn and really comes alive.

On Mount Tabor, as we read from the Gospel this morning: God's light burst forth from the person of Jesus, and he was transfigured. There and then, the three apostles got a glimpse of his divinity, hidden in the depths of his humanity. They were overcome with the beauty and brilliance of it. It was not a surface thing:

but an inner essence, shining through. There on the mountain: through what they had witnessed, they knew beyond all doubt that Jesus was the Son of God.

Within each and every one of us there lies two potentials: – the potential for evil, and the potential for good. All of us are capable of such things as hatred, bitterness, cruelty, greed, envy, lust and so on. These are ugly things and bring out the worst in us. They corrupt. And corruption of the heart hardens the face and darkens the eyes. Evil disfigures us.

Then there's our potential for good. Because all of us are also capable of such things as love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, mercy, compassion and the like. These are beautiful things and bring out the best in us. They purify the heart. And purity of heart softens the face and causes the eyes to shine. Goodness transfigures us.

Basically, we are transfigured by what we love, what excites us, what moves us, what rouses our spirit, what causes us to be awake and alive. What shows us at our brightest and our best!

Van Gogh was not noted for his physical beauty. Yet as soon as he began to speak about art, his melancholy expression would disappear, his eyes would sparkle, and his features would make a deep impression on those around him. His face had become beautiful. It seemed that he was breathing in beauty through his love of art.

Here at St John's, I often look around at people as they minister and serve God and each other. And through the love we show one another, we shine and transformation takes place. Goodness and love transfigure us.

In the scriptures we're told that we are made in the image of God; we carry the splendour of divinity within us. We are at our best when we love.

Like the apostles on Mount Tabor, we too can experience rare moments of light and joy. We get glimpses of the Promised Land towards which we are travelling in faith. In his love for us, God allows us to taste on earth, the joys of the world to come.
