Today's Readings

1st Reading Genesis 21.8-21

⁸ The child grew, and was weaned; and Abraham made a great feast on the day that Isaac was weaned. ⁹ But Sarah saw the son of Hagar the Egyptian, whom she had borne to Abraham, playing with her son Isaac. ¹⁰ So she said to Abraham, 'Cast out this slave woman with her son; for the son of this slave woman shall not inherit along with my son Isaac.' ¹¹ The matter was very distressing to Abraham on account of his son. ¹² But God said to Abraham, 'Do not be distressed because of the boy and because of your slave woman; whatever Sarah says to you, do as she tells you, for it is through Isaac that offspring shall be named after you. ¹³ As for the son of the slave woman, I will make a nation of him also, because he is your offspring.' ¹⁴ So Abraham rose early in the morning, and took bread and a skin of water, and gave it to Hagar, putting it on her shoulder, along with the child, and sent her away. And she departed, and wandered about in the wilderness of Beer-sheba. ¹⁵ When the water in the skin was gone, she cast the child under one of the bushes. ¹⁶ Then she went and sat down opposite him a good way off, about the distance of a bowshot; for she said, 'Do not let me look on the death of the child.' And as she sat opposite him, she lifted up her voice and wept. ¹⁷ And God heard the voice of the boy; and the angel of God called to Hagar from heaven, and said to her, 'What troubles you, Hagar? Do not be afraid; for God has heard the voice of the boy where he is. ¹⁸ Come, lift up the boy and hold him fast with your hand, for I will make a great nation of him.' ¹⁹ Then God opened her eyes, and she saw a well of water. She went, and filled the skin with water, and gave the boy a drink. ²⁰ God was with the boy, and he grew up; he lived in the wilderness, and became an expert with the bow. ²¹ He lived in the wilderness of Paran; and his mother got a wife for him from the land of Egypt.

2nd Reading Romans 6.1-11

¹ What then are we to say? Should we continue in sin in order that grace may abound? ² By no means! How can we who died to sin go on living in it? ³ Do you not know that all of us who have been baptised into Christ Jesus were baptised into his death? ⁴ Therefore we have been buried with him by baptism into death, so that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, so we too might walk in newness of life. ⁵ For if we have been united with him in a death like his, we will certainly be united with him in a resurrection like his. ⁶ We know that our old

self was crucified with him so that the body of sin might be destroyed, and we might no longer be enslaved to sin. ⁷ For whoever has died is freed from sin. ⁸ But if we have died with Christ, we believe that we will also live with him. ⁹ We know that Christ, being raised from the dead, will never die again; death no longer has dominion over him. ¹⁰ The death he died, he died to sin, once for all; but the life he lives, he lives to God. ¹¹ So you also must consider yourselves dead to sin and alive to God in Christ Jesus.

Gospel Reading Matthew 10.24-39

²⁴ 'A disciple is not above the teacher, nor a slave above the master; ²⁵ it is enough for the disciple to be like the teacher, and the slave like the master. If they have called the master of the house Beelzebul, how much more will they malign those of his household! ²⁶ 'So have no fear of them; for nothing is covered up that will not be uncovered, and nothing secret that will not become known. ²⁷ What I say to you in the dark, tell in the light; and what you hear whispered, proclaim from the housetops. ²⁸ Do not fear those who kill the body but cannot kill the soul; rather fear him who can destroy both soul and body in hell. ²⁹ Are not two sparrows sold for a penny? Yet not one of them will fall to the ground unperceived by your Father. ³⁰ And even the hairs of your head are all counted. ³¹ So do not be afraid; you are of more value than many sparrows. ³² 'Everyone therefore who acknowledges me before others, I also will acknowledge before my Father in heaven; ³³ but whoever denies me before others, I also will deny before my Father in heaven. ³⁴ 'Do not think that I have come to bring peace to the earth; I have not come to bring peace, but a sword. ³⁵ For I have come to set a man against his father, and a daughter against her mother, and a daughter-in-law against her mother-in-law; ³⁶ and one's foes will be members of one's own household. ³⁷ Whoever loves father or mother more than me is not worthy of me; and whoever loves son or daughter more than me is not worthy of me; ³⁸ and whoever does not take up the cross and follow me is not worthy of me. ³⁹ Those who find their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake will find it.

for I am poor and in misery.

Hello Dear Friends,

I pray you have all had a blessed week. This Sunday is the Fourth After Pentecost and we pray for life!!! This week's lectionary readings are an interesting mix. We continue reading from Genesis and hear of God saving Hagar and Ishmael. Our Psalmist pleads his case to God as to why his prayers should be heard and then requests help and comfort. Our reading from Romans exhorts us to die to sin and to be in union with Christ and our Gospel reading for this Sunday gives us instruction to "witness in spite of fear."

We can spend much of our lives fearful, anxious and worried yet we are commanded not to - easier said than done and especially in recent times.

I once googled "worry" and I saw a cartoon with a slogan attached. It showed a happy and self-satisfied looking woman - who said in response to her husband telling her not to worry "oh no! Worry really works - I know because 99% of the things I worry about don't happen"!!!

In the Gospel Jesus calls for witnesses, that is, people who are not afraid to be seen to be followers of his out there in the midst of a sceptical and sometimes hostile world. But as we know, fear is one of the things that keeps many Christians from boldly and generously witnessing to the Gospel. So three times Jesus said to the apostles: 'Do not be afraid'.

Fortunately, there are always those in the Church, who by the grace of God, are able to overcome fear and witness to the Gospel in the most difficult and dangerous circumstances.

Oscar Romero is an outstanding example of this. When he was made Archbishop of San Salvador in 1977, he was a conservative. But he soon changed when he saw what was happening. Every Sunday he preached at the cathedral. His homilies so electrified the country that national affairs halted when he spoke from the altar. For he made public, the unspeakable crimes being committed, many by agents of the government.

He was under constant threat of death. Some of his best friends were murdered. And still he would not be silenced. Nor would he go into hiding or exile. 'At the first sight of danger the shepherd cannot run and leave the sheep to fend for themselves. I will stay with my people', he said. He was shot dead in March 1980 while celebrating the Eucharist.

According to Romero it didn't take courage to do what he did. All it took was the understanding that his enemies dealt in fear: and that if he was not afraid of them, they would have no power over him. They might be able to kill his body, but they could not and would not kill his soul.

We celebrate his life each year on 24th March and he was canonised in 2018

There is also the story of the priest, who during the genocide in Rwanda (1994) sheltered Tutsis in his house. When a mob arrived at his door and ordered him to release them, he refused to do so. They shot him and took the people away.

Even though we may not aspire to such heights of heroism, people like these are an inspiration to us. The words of Christ surely apply to them: 'If anyone declares himself for me before men, I will declare myself for them, before my Father in heaven'.

Every Community needs Christian witnesses. Christ says, 'Witness to me before men' .It's in the world we have to stand up and be counted. It's not good enough to be secret disciples of Christ. We are all being called upon to give public witness to our Christian faith.

In some countries to witness to Christ is to place one's life in danger. But in our country, this is not the case. But Australia too needs witnesses, and in many ways it's harder to give witness to our faith in places like Australia, than in those places where they face death to do so: because here, we are likely to face not so much hostility or opposition, but something which is even harder – a deadly indifference. Therefore, to witness in this situation requires a special kind of courage. It means overcoming our fear of what people will think of us, or say about us, and the fear of what it will cost us in terms of letting go of our ego.

Today, our witness is more important than ever. Over recent weeks, many people have had time to pause, reflect and begin questioning and looking to God and church again. We need to be ready to show Christ in our words and deeds and in our welcoming.

When Jesus said to his apostles, 'Do not be afraid', he wasn't saying that they should never feel afraid. Because he knew that at times, they would be afraid. The issue was what fear might do to them. It might paralyse them or make them so timid as to be unable to fulfil their

mission. What Jesus was doing was encouraging them, so that they might be able to move beyond fear.

How were they to overcome their fear? He urged them to have complete trust in God, who lovingly watches over the life and death of even the smallest and least valuable of his creatures

– the sparrows: and if he does that for the sparrow, how much more will he do it for us!

Service of Collation and Ordination at 11am on Saturday 27 June at St Boniface Cathedral Bunbury

God willing, it is Bishop Ian's intention to ordain the following:

- Mrs Nicky Latham as Deacon in the Church of God

- Mrs Michelle Collins as Deacon in the Church of God
- Mrs May Griffiths as Deacon in the Church of God and
- The Reverend Gaerlan Baguil, as Priest in the Church of God - Please pray for all the candidates in their preparations.

It is also Bishop Ian's intention to collate

- The Reverend Canon James Tabor as Archdeacon of the North
- The Reverend Canon Karen Cave, as Archdeacon of the South; and
- The Reverend Justine Richmond as Canon of the Cathedral.

Bishop Ian gave the following announcement to explain the collation.

" I am making the following announcements. A key reason for the first of these is to support Archdeacon Geoff who will be in the position of fulfilling two roles from 29 August as both Archdeacon and Administrator of the diocese.

From the same date, therefore, Canon Karen Cave and Canon James Tabor will become very part-time Archdeacons, South and North respectively, likely the equivalent of one day per week. They will also continue in their present roles, and as Canons, (with one particular exception for Karen referred to below). As well as being regional supports to Archdeacon Geoff, they will also each take on some distinct parts of Geoff's responsibilities. These very part-time Archdeacon roles are for the period of the Interregnum.

In order to enable Karen to undertake this additional task, given her parish and multiple chaplaincy responsibilities, I have asked the Revd Neale Sommersby to become the Area Dean for Stirling Deanery. Canon Karen has diligently occupied this role for some 5 years. I have been acutely conscious that with the loss of Revd John Jones and Revd Helen Barnard, Karen has been carrying a very heavy load. It is my intention to induct Neale as Area Dean for Stirling Deanery at the Ordination Service on 27 June and he will begin from then. The Dean will install the Revd Justine Richmond in the Canon's chair of St. Luke at the Ordination service."
