Today's Readings

1st Reading Genesis 25.19-34

¹⁹ These are the descendants of Isaac, Abraham's son: Abraham was the father of Isaac, ²⁰ and Isaac was forty years old when he married Rebekah, daughter of Bethuel the Aramean of Paddan-aram, sister of Laban the Aramean.

²¹ Isaac prayed to the Lord for his wife, because she was barren; and the LORD granted his prayer, and his wife Rebekah conceived.

²² The children struggled together within her; and she said, 'If it is to be this way, why do I live?' So she went to inquire of the Lord.

²³ And the Lord said to her, 'Two nations are in your womb, and two peoples born of you shall be divided; one shall be stronger than the other, the elder shall serve the younger.'

²⁴ When her time to give birth was at hand, there were twins in her womb.

²⁵ The first came out red, all his body like a hairy mantle; so they named him Esau.

²⁶ Afterwards his brother came out, with his hand gripping Esau's heel; so he was named Jacob. Isaac was sixty years old when she bore them.

²⁷ When the boys grew up, Esau was a skilful hunter, a man of the field, while Jacob was a quiet man, living in tents.

²⁸ Isaac loved Esau, because he was fond of game; but Rebekah loved Jacob.

²⁹ Once when Jacob was cooking a stew, Esau came in from the field, and he was famished.

³⁰ Esau said to Jacob, 'Let me eat some of that red stuff, for I am famished!' (Therefore he was called Edom.)

³¹ Jacob said, 'First sell me your birthright.'

³² Esau said, 'I am about to die; of what use is a birthright to me?'

³³ Jacob said, 'Swear to me first.' So he swore to him, and sold his birthright to Jacob.

³⁴ Then Jacob gave Esau bread and lentil stew, and he ate and drank, and rose and went his way. Thus Esau despised his birthright.

2nd Reading Romans 8.1-11

¹ There is therefore now no condemnation for those who are in Christ Jesus. ² For the law of the Spirit of life in Christ Jesus has set you free from the law of sin and of death. ³ For God has done what the law, weakened by the flesh, could not do: by sending his own Son in the likeness of sinful flesh, and to deal with sin, he condemned sin in the flesh, ⁴ so that the just requirement of the law might be fulfilled in us, who walk not according to the flesh but according to the Spirit. ⁵ For those who live according to the flesh set their minds on the things of the flesh, but those who live according to the Spirit set their

minds on the things of the Spirit. ⁶ To set the mind on the flesh is death, but to set the mind on the Spirit is life and peace. ⁷ For this reason the mind that is set on the flesh is hostile to God; it does not submit to God's law — indeed it cannot, ⁸ and those who are in the flesh cannot please God. ⁹ But you are not in the flesh; you are in the Spirit, since the Spirit of God dwells in you. Anyone who does not have the Spirit of Christ does not belong to him. ¹⁰ But if Christ is in you, though the body is dead because of sin, the Spirit is life because of righteousness. ¹¹ If the Spirit of him who raised Jesus from the dead dwells in you, he who raised Christ from the dead will give life to your mortal bodies also through his Spirit that dwells in you.

Gospel Reading Matthew 13.1-9; 13.18-23

¹ That same day Jesus went out of the house and sat beside the lake. ² Such great crowds gathered around him that he got into a boat and sat there, while the whole crowd stood on the beach. ³ And he told them many things in parables, saying: 'Listen! A sower went out to sow. ⁴ And as he sowed, some seeds fell on the path, and the birds came and ate them up. ⁵ Other seeds fell on rocky ground, where they did not have much soil, and they sprang up quickly, since they had no depth of soil. ⁶ But when the sun rose, they were scorched; and since they had no root, they withered away. ⁷ Other seeds fell among thorns, and the thorns grew up and choked them. ⁸ Other seeds fell on good soil and brought forth grain, some a hundredfold, some sixty, some thirty. ⁹ Let anyone with ears listen!' ¹⁸ 'Hear then the parable of the sower. ¹⁹ When anyone hears the word of the kingdom and does not understand it, the evil one comes and snatches away what is sown in the heart; this is what was sown on the path. ²⁰ As for what was sown on rocky ground, this is the one who hears the word and immediately receives it with joy; ²¹ yet such a person has no root, but endures only for a while, and when trouble or persecution arises on account of the word, that person immediately falls away. ²² As for what was sown among thorns, this is the one who hears the word, but the cares of the world and the lure of wealth choke the word, and it yields nothing. ²³ But as for what was sown on good soil, this is the one who hears the word and understands it, who indeed bears fruit and yields, in one case a hundredfold, in another sixty, and in another thirty.'

The Psalm for today is Psalm 119, Verses 105-112

- 105 Your word is a lantern to my feet:
and a light to my path.
- 106 I have vowed and sworn an oath:
to keep your righteous judgements.
- 107 I have been afflicted beyond measure:
Lord, give me life according to your word.
- 108 Accept, O Lord, the freewill offerings of my mouth:
and teach me your judgements.
- 109 I take my life in my hands continually:
yet I do not forget your law.
- 110 The wicked have laid a snare for me:
but I have not strayed from your precepts.
- 111 Your commands are my inheritance for ever:
they are the joy of my heart.
- 112 I have set my heart to fulfil your statutes:
always, even to the end.

Hello Dear Friends

I hope you are all well. We are blessed with well-known readings this week.

Our Genesis reading is known as a "tale of two sons" and discusses division, inequality and birthright. It's also a lesson in Grace - the most amazing gift from God - something we are never "owed".

Our Roman's reading in just the first verse, "There is now no condemnation for those who are in Christ Jesus," has been described as the theme of the entire word of God - the gospel's heart!

Our Gospel for this Sunday is the well-known parable of the Sower - it asks us "Are we listening? and "What sort of listener (or soil) are we?"

A seed is a marvellous thing – it can make barren ground fruitful. But a seed is an extremely weak and vulnerable thing also. It depends entirely on the kind of soil in which it is sown. If the soil is lacking, the seed will come to nothing: if the soil is good and the conditions are right, it will produce a rich harvest.

So, it is with a word. A word is a powerful thing. It can comfort, inspire, teach, correct, challenge, change a life ... or it can come to nothing. It is completely dependent on the attitude of the one who hears it.

In today's parable: some of the seed fell on a hard path where it had no chance of putting down roots. Exposed to full view, it was eaten up by the birds.

So it is with words that are spoken to people with closed minds. Prejudice closes a person's mind. So does pride – the case of the person who thinks he knows it all. So does fear – fear of new truth: or fear of hearing a disturbing truth. Then some people seem to be unteachable. Trying to get through to them is like knocking your head against a wall. There are none so deaf, as those who will not hear.

Some fell on stony ground, said Jesus. It took root quickly but soon withered away because of lack of soil and moisture.

Some hear the word and receive it with enthusiasm, but when the carrying out of it becomes difficult, their enthusiasm wanes and they quickly abandon it. The lives of some people are littered with things started but never finished.

Some seed fell into ground where weeds and thorns lay in wait. It got off to a good start. But then the weeds appeared, and the seed got smothered.

People may receive the word of God, but there are so many other interests in their lives that the most important thing gets crowded out. People are too busy to pray. People are so involved in their careers that they have no time or energy left for the things of the spirit.

Finally, some seed fell on good soil, where it put down deep roots, found nourishment and produced a harvest. So, there are people who hear the word, understand it, and then act on it. Their lives are enriched by it.

God's word comforts, guides, inspires and challenges us in turn. It is like precious seed. The Sower sowed the seed haphazardly: on the path, on the rocks, among the thorns, and on good ground. You might say that he was wasteful and foolish. But there is another way of looking at this. He was extremely generous, with the seed. He wanted to give every part of the field a chance to produce something.

God keeps on sowing his word in our hearts even though he knows that much of what he sows will be eaten by the birds or fall on rocks or among thorns.

In nature the seed has only a short growing season in the year. Not so with that seed: which is the word of God. Growth can come at any stage in a person's life.

Some grains of wheat were found in the tomb of one of the kings of ancient Egypt. Someone planted and watered them. To the amazement of everyone, the grains came to life and began to grow, after five thousand years lying in a tomb.

The seed of God's word, once dropped into the human heart, never dies. It's never too late to act on the word of God.

So, today, we are guided to listen, to seek justice, equity and respect and to love with the same love as the Sower in our Gospel because He loved with an outrageous love, and gave with outrageous generosity, outrageous grace, and He tended each plant with gentleness and care, and none was disregarded.
