Dear Sisters and Brothers,

Greetings! We have apparently had the coldest and wettest July spell in the South-West for some years. Bluff Knoll has had 3 days of snow and Busselton has been deluged, although the Wheat Belt could still use more rain. In South Australia the rain has come at last but they too are praying for more. Bishop Jeremy James in Willochra spoke to me yesterday about their delight in seeing the hay trucks that had arrived from WA, the aptly named 'Convoy of Compassion'.

Meanwhile, we weep for the situation in Gaza and Israel, in Ukraine and so many places where human tragedy is occurring. One of the organisations who send me prayer requests is called *Embrace the Middle East*. Since the end of May they have been asking Christians to spend a day a week in fasting and prayer for Gaza.

Ever found change difficult? For some years pinprick cataracts in the centre of my eyes have been regularly monitored because of the risks to accurate vision, if they grew any larger, especially for piloting. Finally, this year they began to become a problem. Consequently, I have had two cataract ops over a space of a month. The result has been astonishing. Previously short-sighted, for the first time in six decades I can now see distance perfectly and unaided. (CASA prefer distance lenses being inserted for pilots in cataract surgery). The catch is I can no longer read print or operate a computer without glasses. Furthermore, with hastily acquired reading glasses to perform these functions, I cannot see anything further away distinctly. So, for the first time in well over half a century, I am needing to use glasses the complete opposite way round.

We are creatures of habit, something Google informs me was originally investigated by psychologist William James in the late 19<sup>th</sup> century. He apparently described habit as "a routine, behaviour, or even cognitive process that starts spontaneously but is repeated automatically as a result of prior experience." Thus, after decades of repetition, I am having to re-learn behaviour in order to see both near and far.

Habit can inhabit our ecclesial experience and expectations. Because 'church' can be so associated with particular forms of liturgy, music and worship and certain services and events, it is often hard to view a different concept of church. The New Testament did: as a living body of people, young, old and inbetween, joined together in worship, communion and mission to encourage one another, bear each other's burdens, share talents and resources, and bring glory to God. Covid was one way in which our experience and expectations of church were tested. Diminishing numbers in some of our parishes and communities is another way in which this is happening.

God, on the other hand, is in the business of change. John the Baptist called people to *metanoia* – repentance – literally: change of mind or heart, with an expectation that this is what is most needed to change practice. One of our ordinands recently quoted Romans 12.2 in an essay: "Do not be conformed to the pattern of this world but be *transformed* by the renewing of your mind. Then you will be able to test and approve what God's will is – his good, pleasing and perfect will." The Greek for transformed is of course *meta-morphosis*. This is radical change. You can find many instances of this throughout scripture, such as Isaiah 43.18-19: "Do not remember the former things or consider the things of old. I am about to do a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it? I will make a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert."

As we consider a new Vision and Strategy for the diocese, what is God's Holy Spirit leading us to be and to do? Can we find good and creative ways to fulfill God's plan of church? My glasses experience is only a short-term challenge and not significant. I will soon have different multi-focal lenses and no longer need to juggle glasses on and off. Being the church, I believe God is calling us to be, is a longer-term challenge, but an incredibly important and significant one.


#### **A New Primate**

Following due process and discernment, the Right Reverend Dr Mark Short, Bishop of the Diocese of Canberra and Goulburn, was elected to the position. Bishop Mark (pictured below) secured the required majority votes across all three orders of bishops, clergy and laity. Upon confirmation of the result, he accepted the appointment.

# Retirement of Revd Audrey Payne & Revd Allan Taylor – Living Water, Albany

On Sunday 29th June, Living Water acknowledged and gave thanks to God for Revd Audrey Payne & Revd Allan Taylor for their many years of ministry. The following accounts were written to mark this occasion... (with thanks to Revd Shane). This story just missed last month's To the People.

#### **Revd Audrey Payne**

After a 40-year nursing career that took her from the UK to Kenya and PNG, Audrey joined Living Water in 2000 and quickly became involved in almost every part of church life. Ordained as a deacon in 2012 at the age of 69, and priest the following year, she served as locum at Southern Ranges Parish from 2014-2015 before returning to Living Water as an active "retired" priest and authoring her memoir along the way. From 2016, Audrey continued to serve faithfully on rosters and led services as needed, until recent health challenges signalled it was time to step back.

### **Revd Allan Taylor**

Allan was ordained in 1990 after hearing the call to ministry a few years earlier. His early years were spent serving in Corrigin, then Kojonup from 1996, where he was diagnosed with a brain tumour. Following successful surgery though with some limitations to driving, Allan continued to serve with quiet strength and dedication. He moved to Albany and spent the next 20 years as chaplain to the prison, nursing homes, hospital, and Mission to Seafarers, ministering from St John's on York Street. At different times, Allan also stepped in as priest-in-charge at both St John's and Living Water during vacancies, before settling into ministry based at Living Water. Allan and Audrey have been faithful servants of God's church, and for their dedicated ministry and service over many years we give thanks to them and to the Lord.

# An extract from Reyne's Testimony – shared with permission

"The first time I rocked up here months ago, I remember awkwardly saying hello to the few people I could remember as a kid coming here, and I sat down in an aisle on my own away from anyone because I didn't really want to be seen. And a girl called Abbey came and sat next to me. Within what felt like literally 20 seconds, Abbey introduced herself, reminded me that we used to do choir together in high school, and that I should come to her Bible Study group, which was ran by a guy called Cameron. And that's Abbey, she ended up running away, and after the service, Cameron Fildes spotted me like a dear in hunting season. He took the time to get to know me and invited me to the Bible Study Abbey had mentioned, and honestly everything after that has felt like a blur to me.



Since that day, I've either read the Bible or reflected on its message daily. I've read more of the bible in the last 3 months of my life then the rest of it in total. I pray nearly every single day. I've found a community that's openly accepted me and friends I never would have found without God. I feel loved again. I quit doing drugs and letting weed control my life. Through Christ, I feel my hearts been made flesh again. But most importantly, I've realised the sacrifice Jesus Christ made for everyone, myself included, and the forgiveness we obtained through that. I spent a really long time chasing external love, and I've

realised the only love that I need to chase is my fathers in heaven. Amen."

"Good afternoon Mama Selline. Hope you're well.




### **Revds David Russell and David Bardesley**



### **Sustainable Living Working Group August Update.**

There are many events in August which link in with sustainable living, such as Keep Australia Beautiful Week. Homelessness week is also in August - we must not forget that this is also a sustainable living issue – the just sharing of the resources of the earth. However, perhaps preparing for the Season of Creation could be an important focus for parishes and agencies during the month of August.

The Season of Creation is a time for Christians to come together in prayer and action for Creation. It is observed annually from September 1<sup>st</sup> to October 4<sup>th</sup>.

An event held recently at the Dunsborough Parish was a Sustainable Christmas Workshop, where a group of 23 people got together to share fellowship and to make Christmas decorations out of items that might have otherwise gone to landfill. Using all donated materials, sourced from the Op Shop and from parishioners, Christmas items were made from old books, scraps of yarn, glass jars, toilet roll tubes, discarded clothing and even single use coffee cups rescued from the bin! The group decided that the classy items they made were much better than the rubbish they buy from the shops – even though technically the items they made were all made of rubbish. 




## **Homelessness in Bunbury**

### A contemplative life? A Message from Dr. Don Reid

When I first heard this phrase, some people said 'What nonsense! You can't just sit around all day, being so heavenly minded as to be of no earthly use! It's just navel-gazing, no use to anybody!' Well, that may be one view, but as I have grown older in faith, and continue to reflect on life in general, there's more to living a contemplative life than many people think. It isn't only something far too high and holy to achieve.

Since mid-2017, I have been sending out weekly meditations to a group for a contemplation session the following day on Zoom. The pattern is usually some quiet music, then 15 minutes of silence, then more music to end. Do I distinguish between the words meditation and contemplation? Yes, based on a simple approach related to their word roots – 'med', middle, centre; 'con', with, and 'templum', sacred space. In summary, the program I offer is both: a meditation text to think about actively on one day; contemplation and not thinking, being still, on the next.

During the silence, our work is to willingly enter the contemplative process variously described as letting go, resting, floating, trusting and so on. It is more difficult than it looks because of our brain's constant activity. To help us during our prayer, another part of this type of prayer is to use our breath, or a sacred word or phrase, to constantly re-focus on when our minds wander.

Why am I talking about contemplation as a way of life? I see it now as a necessary contribution to the kingdom of God, to peace on earth. (Not the only way of course – the Spirit of God is full of variety! – but a way that has been, and still is, often neglected.) Over time, we slowly learn we can treat others as we are treating ourselves during contemplation: letting go hurts and regrets, being slower to anger, readier to laugh, refusing to express the feeling of pressure to be 'right' all the time, and so on to other growth areas in our relationships. We seek fairness for and kindness to others, because we discover this is possible for ourselves – because of the love of God in Christ. We might even be showing Christ to those people around us!

What I believe we don't do in contemplation is place demands on God – none, that is, beyond the hope, indeed the expectation, of God's continuing unconditional love, forgiveness and strength being poured out to us and so available.

It takes time to be still, and some learning effort. All we have to do is continue to turn up, to sit in outer and inner silence as best we can, preferably with others, and allow God's Spirit room to work. The rest is up to us. You're all invited, so let me know if you'd like to give it a go.

Let's share the music!
