The content of these Hub meetings will be listening to parishes and Anglican communities, working on the new Vision and Strategic plan, building sustainable ministry and updating about Work, Health and Safety and Insurance.

#### Christ the King Sunday – 23 November – 'Ministry Support Fund'

Please find leaflet attached. We are also printing copies if you would like some. Please note we have recently renamed 'The Foundation for Ministry' the 'Ministry Support Fund', mostly because it was not a Foundation per se. We have also changed the bank account details, so these funds are kept separate.

As reported at Synod, people have given generously to this fund either in one-off gifts for Christ the King Sunday, or by regular giving. As a result, we raised \$46,600 over the



past year. This money is used to train our ordinands, including paying for psychology assessments and Intensives. It is also used for new mission initiatives and for other training for licensed lay and ordained ministers. We continue to be blessed with more people believing God is calling them into ministry, so the need for these funds continues. Seed money for new initiatives is also very precious.

## WA Governor's Chaplaincy Awards - our 2 winning chaplains out of 100s across the State

At the age of 86, Archdeacon Emeritus Brian Newing won the Community Chaplaincy Award for his prison chaplaincy work and Canon Karen Cave was a finalist in the Regional Chaplaincy Award for all the chaplain's hats that she wears with Amana Living, the Police, Seafarers and the Hospital. Brian is being presented by Mrs Dawson, the Governor's wife. Our own Revd Brent Findlay was part of the organisation as the Awards ceremony is run by Youth Care. There were many moving accounts about chaplaincy work across WA.









## **Synod 2025**

For the first time in eleven years Synod was held in Albany with Living Water as our generous hosts. They had gone to enormous trouble, including erecting a huge marquee that had been purchased specially, putting on all the meals and tea breaks and arranging and re-arranging the furniture and PA system to accommodate the workings of Synod and a special Synod evening meal together.

We had a presentation from the three Principals of our Anglican schools, Mrs Tracey Gray, Mr Matthew O'Brien and Mr Brad Evans, encouraging us to pray for their important work and indeed for a new chaplain at Bunbury Cathedral Grammar School. Dr Renae Barker guided us through some legislative changes that were needed and Revd Nick Freeland, as Registrar, took us carefully through the financial reports which showed why we will need to find ways to balance our diocesan books. Synod voted to approve a 1% increase in the parish assessment but did not vote for a possible rearrangement of how conference and retreat fees are currently paid. This will revert to the next Bishop in Council meeting in December. Mrs Rosemary Cussons and Mrs Karen Reeves were voted onto Bishop in Council and the Trustees respectively.



# A message from the Archbishop of Canterbury Designate, Dame Sarah Mullally

#### Our Synod passed the following motion:

"That the Synod gives thanks for the work of the Crown Nomination Commission. That this Synod recognises the election of Bishop Sarah Mullally as the 106<sup>th</sup> Archbishop of Canterbury. Commends in prayer the Church of England, the Anglican Communion, and the Archbishop of Canterbury designate, asking God's wisdom, grace and guidance for her leadership and ministry in the years ahead. That Synod asks the Bishop to convey this motion to the Archbishop of Canterbury designate. That Synod invites Bishop Sarah Mullally to visit the Diocese should she ever visit Australia." We wrote to Dame Sarah, currently Bishop of London, and received this reply:

Thank you for your delightful email sending congratulations and telling me of the motion passed by the Bunbury Diocesan Synod! Your words and theirs are a great encouragement to me.

It was wonderful to hear from you and I am very grateful for your open invitation to visit you in Australia.


Thank you, too, for your prayers, and you of course are in mine.



### 16 Days of Activism: November 23 - December 10, 2025

As part of a global initiative, the Anglican Church of Australia has developed resources for the 2025 16 days of activism against gender-based violence campaign. These include Sunday prayers,



devotions and a series of social media images for churches to utilise. Organisations around the world will be playing their part to highlight this problem during this period, and it is a opportunity for our church to show that God cares and we care about the injustice and suffering of those impacted by gender-based violence.

This initiative relates to COMMITMENT SEVEN in the Ten Commitments for Prevention and Response to Domestic and Family Violence in the Anglican Church of Australia which says:

Our church supports cultural change in our communities by communicating effectively to our members.

#### New DV posters for churches and dioceses.

The FCC has developed a new awareness poster and companion business card for dioceses and churches to use in visible community spaces. Designed to be displayed on church noticeboards, in bathrooms, and other high-traffic areas, these resources are a way to communicate care and support. The poster and card provide clear messages that the Church cares for those affected by domestic and family violence and direct people to avenues of help—both within the Church and through trusted external services. ## Sustainable Community Workshops.

Something the Dunsborough Parish has recently launched is a series of Sustainable Sewing Workshops. The Parish successfully applied for a grant to run these workshops which allows them not only to encourage people to treasure creation, but also to financially support the community groups who are working in the sustainability space. Our partners contribute 50% of their time "in kind" and the grant supports them with the remainder. This also makes the workshops affordable for participants.

Each month, participants work on a different project. This month they made cushion covers out of men's shirts that were not able to be sold in our Op Shop. This enables them to learn skills with their sewing machines as well.

Next month, the focus is on sustainable Christmas wrapping where one project will be to use the sleeves of the shirts from their cushion cover project to make wine bottle gift bags! Even better, along with the sustainability education, there is a lot of chatter, laughter and companionship.
